Joel Salatin is a third generation alternative farmer in Virginia's Shenandoah Valley. The family's farm, Polyface Inc., achieved iconic status after being featured in the *New York Times* bestseller *The Omnivore's Dilemma* by food guru **Michael Pollan**.

Polyface Farm's choreographed plant-animal symbiosis heals the landscape, the community, and the eater. The grass-based multi-species livestock farm services more than 1,500 families, 10 retail outlets, and 30 restaurants through on-farm sales and metropolitan buying clubs.
